RTD Procedures

As a student in the College of Arts and Science you are required to meet minimum performance standards as detailed at http://www.usask.ca/programs/colleges-schools/arts-science/index.php.

We have completed our average calculations for the 2012-2013 academic year and unfortunately you have not met the minimum standard and are 'Required to Discontinue' (RTD). This faculty action means that you will not be permitted to register in the College of Arts & Science for the 2013-2014 academic year between September 1, 2013 and August 31, 2014.

You may have experienced extenuating circumstances that impacted your academic performance. In these cases students can appeal the RTD. If you had extenuating circumstances such as:

- * medical problems (personal or family);
- * serious unexpected financial difficulty; and/or
- * compassionate situations (e.g. death in the family).

You can appeal the RTD IN WRITING within 30 days of this e-mail.

The appeal must:

- * be written by you;
- * contain documented evidence of the extenuating circumstances, e.g. a doctor's certificate or copy of an obituary:
- * provide your student number, mailing address, U of S email address, and telephone number (or numbers) at which you can be reached.

Even though you have received a faculty action and are 'Required to Discontinue' there are a number of options open to you. You can meet with an academic advisor to explore your options by phoning the Undergraduate Student Office at 966-4231 to set up an appointment.

Below are some options to consider:

- * As stated above, if your academic performance was hindered due to extenuating circumstances you can appeal the Faculty Action
- * You could remain out of university for a year; identify barriers that may have hindered your success and plan for future academic and/or career undertakings.
- * You may also apply to other post-secondary institutions to take courses for transfer credit towards your University of Saskatchewan Arts and Science degree program.

If you enroll in courses during your 'Required to Discontinue' year, you must meet the minimum transfer average of 60% on transferable courses to be considered for readmission to the College of Arts and Science.

Please Note: you will retain credit for courses successfully completed during the first two quarters of Spring/Summer 2013, but the marks received do not alter the 'Required to Discontinue' status.

After serving your faculty action, you can return to the College to complete an Arts and Science degree. Please seek advising before returning. Advisors can support you in goal planning, discussing course loads and degree requirements, helping you to develop an action plan to improve your academic performance.

Please Note: Should you decide to resume your studies in this College after August, 2014, you must apply for re-admission through Admissions, Student and Enrolment Services Division online at http://www.usask.ca/admissions.php.

Please Note: if this is not your first faculty action of "Required to Discontinue" an appeal will be required for readmission.

We are contacting you to remind you that you are currently in academic difficulty. This assessment is based on a review of your Term One final examinations and midterm grades in 6 credit unit courses, as of the end of December. At this time we are hoping to focus your attention to, and encourage you to consider options which will help you return to good academic standing before the end of Term Two. To do this we are offering you an opportunity to meet with an academic advisor during the week of February 4th to February 14, 2013.

- * Pick the classes best suited to your academic interests
- * Clarify the promotion, probation, and required to discontinue rules and regulations
- * Learn about restrictions on repeating courses
- * Learn how to calculate your average
